Spitz Foundation Issues \$10,000 Grant to Jewish Elderly of Eastern PA

The Robert H. Spitz Foundation has issued a \$10,000 grant to support the 55+ Division of the Jewish Resource Center of the Poconos (JRC). The Foundation for the Jewish Elderly of Eastern PA, that guides and backs this program, received the Spitz Foundation grant on behalf of the Jewish Resource Center.

The JRC's 55+ Division includes the Thursday Lunch Club, sponsored by Monroe County, the CLOSER program (Cultural Outreach, Socialization and Education for Retirees) and the Sunshine Club. The 55+ Division has plans to expand its offerings to include retirement planning, preemptive healthcare, healthy nutrition, cooking, physical education and support groups for dementia, Parkinson's, and Alzheimer's diseases.

Having this as part of our tool kit to fight the pandemic provides us with a stronger means to save lives, control the spread and an expectance of an improvement in our ability to socialize safely as we move forward into 2021. The scientists are projecting that our country will reach herd immunity once we have at least 70% of the population vaccinated.

The focus of our vaccine campaign at the Jewish Home has been educationally-based to provide our residents, families and staff with the scientific information on how the vaccine works and its effectiveness as means to control the pandemic. We will be sharing our final numbers when our clinic is complete. As of the publication of this article, our numbers of acceptance from the Jewish Home residents and staff should be coming in at 78% if all who signed up for the vaccine series complete it. We still will be providing education to those who have not yet accepted, as well as new staff and residents coming into our building, so we are optimistic that a higher number will be achieved.

Our campaign theme is that we are an essential piece in solving the much larger puzzle of COVID-19 by getting the vaccine. Our first clinic date was held on January 15, 2021, with other dates offered in our building up to March 3, 2021. In addition to T-shirts, our staff also filled out a puzzle piece sharing why they are taking the vaccine which was used to form the word "hope" as you walk in our building. Many thoughtful answers were shared. To sum up and borrow a phrase from one staff member's puzzle piece, which demonstrates the feelings of many of our staff members: "I am being vaccinated to protect my family and my work family." That is really what the Jewish Home is all about. We are hopeful that everyone will do their part and receive the vaccination in the greater community to help bring about herd immunity and control the spread across the world.

Thank you, and we are looking forward to sharing more with you as we move forward into 2021.

Jewish Home Earns Certification as Center of Excellence in Wound Management from VOHRA

In supporting The Jewish Home of Eastern PA's mission to provide high-quality care, we are expanding our wound care program to better care for those members in our community that have clinically-complex wounds. We now accept residents with more complex pressure injuries and other wound types, such as those from certain diseases and accidental trauma. It is estimated that more than 2.5 million people in the United States develop pressure injuries each year. Unfortunately, prevalence is widespread in all care settings. All wound types bring pain, associated risk for serious infection, and increased health care interventions. Pressure injuries are a leading threat to quality of care. In skilled and long-term care, a significant number of residents are admitted with existing pressure injuries that have developed in the community or during their stay at a hospital.

Others will have pressure injuries develop during their skilled nursing facility stay due to reasons of clinical comorbidities, lack of mobility, or decline in functional status even with proactive interventions in place.

An important component of our expanded wound care program involves our partnership with VOHRA Wound Care. A VOHRA specialty trained physician comes directly to the Jewish Home to extend their wound care expertise, develop treatment plans, consult and guide resident treatment, and provide in-service education to our nursing staff, improving their overall wound care competency. Utilizing a wound care physician-based group has many advantages in both short-term and long-term care. Besides bringing expertise to the resident's bedside, a physician-based wound group allows for less disruption of our resident's day, along with less pain, and lower costs from transportation back and forth to a wound care center. Our residents also build a trusting relationship with their provider that comes weekly to assess and treat their wounds. These wound rounds are the perfect opportunity for the VORHA Physician and Jewish Home's clinical team to collaborate to provide the highest level of quality care.

An Inside Look at Our Newly Renovated Therapy Gym

The Jewish Home is happy to announce the opening of our newly renovated rehabilitation therapy gym. This addition to our facility allows us to better accommodate residents throughout their journey to recovery. The changes made to the gym make it more functional and resident-centered.

An Activities of Daily Living suite was added to allow residents to work on maintaining balance while performing everyday practical tasks, such as washing dishes or setting the table. Additional storage was also added to ensure there is enough space in the gym for residents to practice social distancing comfortably. The main door was widened to allow room for clinicians to walk with residents, ensuring residents' safety when entering and exiting the gym.

Two new pieces of equipment were added to the gym. The rebounder facilitates the clinician's focus of balance and vestibular training, and the theracycles enable residents with conditions like Parkinson's disease to work on flexibility and range of motion.

"I love the new gym," Therapy Program Manager, Melissa Gibblets, said, "Residents seem to be smiling more during therapy, and their energy when they are working on their goals in the gym is upbeat. In my opinion, how the residents feel plays a large role in their journey to getting better and reaching their personal goals."

Gibblets and the rehabilitation team are very appreciative of the renovation. "Our residents are enjoying the space," Gibblets said, "and when they are happy, we are happy."



Telemedicine Service Provides Round-the-Clock Care

The Jewish Home has subscribed to Curavi Health to provide telemedicine that supports efficient management of all after-hour clinical needs among our residents. Curavi offers technology-enabled telemedicine services customized for post-acute and long-term care. Curavi is focused on enabling treatment-in-place through telemedicine technology and clinical knowledge that improves the well-being of residents.

Through the use of this technology, Curavi Telemedicine providers can assess a resident, develop a treatment plan consistent with care plan goals, and communicate orders to the nurses at the Jewish Home of Eastern PA. All of the Curavi physicians are board-certified geriatricians.

The Jewish Home is pleased to offer this additional level of care for our residents as Curavi Health will be available

to the facility Monday through Thursday from 6pm to 6am, and Friday from 6 pm through Monday at 6 am. Holidays will be covered 24 hours.




Our Residents & Families Say it Best!

The results are in for our 2020 Resident and Family Satisfaction Survey!
