Strengthening Care Coordination Ensures Seamless Transition Between Elan Skilled Nursing And Rehab And Elan Gardens Senior Living

In August 2022, an organizational restructuring more closely aligned Elan Skilled Nursing and Rehab and Elan Gardens Senior Living as providers within the same organization offering a continuum of senior care and services.

One benefit of this restructuring is the impact to residents with care transitions, particularly between skilled nursing and personal care. Moving from one care setting to another creates a period of significant vulnerability for residents, including an increased risk of a negative, adverse event due to the lack of or mistakes in communication between the care settings. A safe and effective transfer between care settings relies heavily on communication- from the discharging provider to the receiving provider- about key aspects of that resident's care, such as medical diagnoses, current medications, treatments, and follow-up plans.

The restructuring provided an opportunity for our teams to look closely at our internal processes, including how we worked together in coordinating care for residents who move from one location to another within our Jewish Senior Life organization. Key elements of our internal focus included our existing channels of communication and care management protocols. Our relationship positioned us to pool our collective resources and establish a model of care coordination that now incorporates our organizational best practices.

At one time, the typical progression through the senior living continuum of care saw residents move from independent living to personal care and then to a skilled nursing facility. Over the past several years, we have seen a huge shift in utilization of both skilled nursing and personal care services. We now care for individuals who enter the continuum at all levels of care. Movement through the continuum is no longer solely based



on declining function; instead, quite frequently it is based on improvement in function. We now see individuals transition from the hospital to skilled nursing and then into personal care.

A skilled nursing facility provides a variety of models of care, all of which are focused on seniors with very different health problems and care needs. One transformation in skilled nursing care has focused specialized care for residents requiring complex care management and therapy services following an inpatient hospital stay.

The average length of stay on the typical post-acute care unit averages 14 to 30 days. There are times when individuals meet their goals for skilled nursing discharge but are not quite ready to transition back home to the community. Perhaps they need more staff support than can be provided at home, their home requires modifications for safety, or they need more therapy in an outpatient setting to improve strength and function to safely navigate their home lavout. Personal care can be a cost-effective and a less restrictive care alternative for short-term outpatient therapy needs. Because Elan Skilled Nursing and Rehab and Elan Gardens Senior Living share the same therapy provider and the same therapists, transitioning from Flan Skilled's short-term care unit. to Elan Gardens transitional care suites to continue outpatient therapy can be seamless.

"One of our goals with the restructuring was to create a transitional care team that consists of key staff members from both Elan Skilled Nursing and Rehab and Elan Gardens. We have seen first-hand the powerful impact of thoughtful care management to facilitate a seamless transition between our organizations supporting our residents on their journey to recovery. Residents can enter our continuum at any level of care and know that should the need to transition to a different care setting that our transition team will ensure a seamless handoff," says Mary Rose Applegate.

Brittany Elko. Elan Gardens Senior Living Administrator, is proud of the team effort between Elan Skilled and Elan Gardens in strengthening their care transition services. "Often, this is the first experience a resident and their family has in an inpatient post-acute care setting," she says. "They don't know what to expect and the senior living continuum can be extremely complex to navigate. Our team helps fill those knowledge gaps providing valuable insight into the variety of care and services offered within the Elan family. Providing the right care in the right setting at the right time for every resident our team touches is one more step in preventing a negative adverse outcome and ensuring a safe transition."



Capital Campaign For The Short Term Rehab Unit And Dialysis Den Is Moving Forward



Jewish Senior Life of Eastern Pennsylvania is a premier healthcare provider in the community. Our innovative mission

focused programs and services deserves broad support. Elan Skilled Nursing and Rehab - formerly known as the Jewish Home - serves people from all faith communities, we make our facilities welcome and encourage the diversity and participation in faith observances celebrated by our residents and staff. The center of our mission is the commitment that we make to serving members of the Jewish Faith. As the only facility in Eastern Pennsylvania providing kosher meals and Jewish observances, residents from our Jewish community feel especially at home.

Our short stay 20 bed rehab unit - the Bridge at Elan is scheduled to be completed in early April 2023. This unit incorporates a 6 chair dialysis den which will be available exclusively to all residents of Elan Skilled. The dialysis den is a state of the art investment serving seniors and demonstrates why mission based not for profit healthcare is so important for our community. Elan Skilled Nursing was only able to make this investment because of the confidence the leadership has that our generous donors and supporters will continue to support us, and strategically is using the launch of this unit to help sustain our mission as we move forward.

A capital campaign was formally launched to assist fund raising to support this capital project at our Elan Skilled community. As we are going to press we have received donations and pledges from Foundations (including the Weinberg Foundation which has been remarkably supportive of the institution over the years) and individuals amounting to over \$2,175,000. There are many expected donations are still outstanding. Pledges may be spread out over several years.

The Board anticipates investments of \$7 Million dollars over the next several years, and we have applied for matching money from the Pennsylvania State's Redevelopment Assistance Capital Program (RCAP). This new floor is only the beginning. We have at least \$7 Million in additional investment to make to keep our facilities state of the art and competitive. Many thanks to our committed supporters who make it possible to continue to work and mission of services that we provide to our residents.

Nursing Leadership Team Provides Critical Support to Advancing Elan Skilled Nursing and Rehab's Competitive Advantage

As Elan Skilled forges its latest path in implementation of its strategic plan, the impact of Elan Skilled's clinical leadership has been felt at all levels of the organization. In just a few short months, The Bridge at Elan will begin caring for its first patients in need of rehabilitation and clinical management for medically complex patients transitioning from the hospital to their community home or from one care setting to another. Care on this specialized unit will focus on assisting in recovery providing the complex rehabilitation and nursing care the patient needs to regain their usual level of independence. This highly specialized care is considerably more complex and intense than the care typically provided for our long-term residents or those who live on the Weinberg Alzheimer's Unit.

The type of care that will be provided on The Bridge at Elan is quite familiar to Elan Skilled's Clinical Operations Executive, Gina McCabe, who brings 30+ years of acute care experience with her to Elan Skilled. While Gina has vast experience caring for patients with complex medical conditions, she also has several years' experience providing leadership to the nursing teams who provide the day-to-day care. "One of the things I am most proud of in my time at Elan Skilled is the professional develop-

ment of our nursing team. We have a cohesive group of very capable nurses and nursing assistants who are empowered to take responsibility for their resident's care needs. We have spent a lot of effort transitioning from being primarily task - focused to educating our team on the rationale and implications behind the tasks - continually building and honing critical thinking skills," reports Gina. "We have really focused on team building, frequent touch points with the staff, and celebrating the successes".

Elan Skilled certainly has a recent track record of successes to celebrate. The Department of Health recently finished Elan's annual inspection in early February noting just two minor findings. The average number of citations issued to nursing facilities annually in Pennsylvania is 8 and nationally averages 8.6. Since 2021, Elan Skilled has performed better than their peers at both the national and state levels with improvements in survey performance noted each year.

Along with the stellar survey performance, Elan Skilled is currently rated a 4-Star in their Overall Rating on CMS' 5 Star Rating System. Health inspection performance is one part of this overall rating along with staff-

ing and quality measures. The quality measures star rating measures the home's performance in certain areas of resident care intended to reflect the quality of the care provided. Elan Skilled was most recently awarded a 5-Star by CMS in their quality measure performance. "These quality measures reflect the care provided to both our long-term residents as well as our short-stay, transitional care patients. We were awarded a 5-Star score in our care of both populations. I could not be more proud of our team here at Elan Skilled. Our staff in all departments have worked incredibly hard for these achievements - these are monumental successes in our industry that is 100% attributed to our staff and the efforts they give each and every day in the care of our residents", explains Mary Rose Applegate, Executive Director Administrator.



Elan Skilled's performance in certain key quality measures provides valuable insight into the quality care that seniors will receive on The Bridge at Elan. Some quality measures are reflective of the quality of care provided to residents with more intense care needs, such as rehabilitation and management of complex medical conditions. Preventing readmissions to the hospital and emergency department visits are two indicators that health systems and insurers really focus on in evaluating a nursing facility's care. Elan Skilled performs far better than their peers at both the state and national levels in both of these indicators. Only 12.6% of Elan

Skilled short-term residents were re-hospitalized after admission compared to 21 – 22% across the state and nation. Similarly, just 4% of Elan Skilled's short-term residents were transferred to the emergency department for evaluation or treatment compared to 9.3% and 11.8% at the state and national levels respectively. Gina McCabe credits this to the focus on the Home's education and training programs that have provided the staff with the resources they need to effectively perform their jobs. She pulls on her vast experience in creating a positive, team-oriented environment where learning opportunities move you one step closer to mastering or honing your skillset.

The utilization of telemedicine services provides another resource that improves patient care and outcomes and is not available in every nursing facility. Providing residents with access to medical care on a 24/7 basis allows individualized care to be delivered timely and more effectively, often mitigating serious complications that can quickly impact vulnerable seniors. This is another benefit available to all residents at Elan Skilled. Gina adds, "Our nursing staff are intimately familiar with the residents in their care and are quick to identify subtle changes in condition that can be effectively addressed by a physician through our telemedicine program. We utilize specialized equipment, such as stethoscopes, cameras, otoscopes, EKG machines, and other assessment and monitoring equipment designed for our telemedicine platform that allows the physician to effectively assess the resident and provide an "in person" experience. Adding the telemedicine physician(s) to our highly competent Elan Skilled nursing team provides our residents with the best quality outcomes."

The Bridge at Elan is expected to begin caring for residents in April 2023, offering rehabilitation programs, high acuity nursing care and clinical management for medically complex patients, and onsite dialysis services for seniors transitioning from the hospital to home or another care setting. Accommodating up to 20 patients on our newly renovated unit offers a well-appointed environment and amenities to enhance healing. Multi-disciplinary care, that includes physical, occupational and speech therapy rehabilitation, specialized medical services available around the clock, and discharge planning that accommodates patient goals are among the broad range of services provided to effectively bridge the gap between acute care and home. Onsite dialysis, managed in partnership with DaVita Kidney Care, will be provided in the 1200 square foot dialysis den located directly on the unit. Both long-term and short-stay residents can receive dialysis services onsite promoting more effective care coordination and improved quality of life.

Foundation For Jewish Elderly Assists Elan Skilled Nursing And Rehab To Continue Support Outreach Parkinson's Programs In The Community.

In 2019, prior to the world-changing COVID-19 pandemic, Elan Skilled Nursing and Rehab, formerly the Jewish Home of Eastern PA, was successful in launching a Parkinson's disease program to serve both our residents and the general community via outreach programs co-sponsored with the Jewish Community Centers in Wilkes Barre and Scranton.

Grants from the Parkinson's Foundation and the Moses Taylor Foundation were obtained by Elan Skilled Nursing and Rehab to support the outreach programs to community free of charge. While the pandemic in 2020 did impact these program initially, both JCC's were successful in continuing to offering virtual programming for these programs during pandemic. At this time, both community programs have been able to return to in person classes.

Elan Skilled supports the instructor expense for a once weekly Dance for Parkinson's class and equipment which we were able to obtain from a grant from the Moses Taylor Foundation used in their Pedaling for Parkinson's Program and Dance programs. Dance with Parkinson's program has moved to swim exercise class lead by Linn McDonald. The program is held each Thursday from 1 pm to 1:45 pm. Pedaling for Parkinson's will be starting on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 10:30am-11:15pm led by Jo Akers. The Jewish Community Alliance of the Friedman JCC, Parkinson's Program jointly started prior to COVID, is back in full operation and growing. We have continued this relationship with them by covering the cost of the program instructors for their twice a week Parkinson's exercise on Monday's and Thurs at 11:00 am lead by Debbie Grossman,

and weekly Dance with Parkinson's Program lead by Linn McDonald on Tuesdays at 11:00 am. Please contact Brando Heffelfinger at the Friedman JCC at 570-824-4646 if you or someone you know with Parkinson's would like to join these programs in the Wilkes Barre area.

In 2020, the Spitz Foundation provided funding to support music therapy for Parkinson's through a grant administered by our Foundation for Jewish Elderly to residents at Elan Skilled Nursing and Rehab. This program is still ongoing. Our residents continue to enjoy benefits of resident specific music therapy weekly through this grant.

Many thanks to for the support received from the Foundation for Jewish Elderly which allow us to continue and hopefully build upon these programs that serve both our residents and the general community.

During the height of the COVID-19 pandemic, telehealth physician visits were strongly encouraged and, in some areas, were the only form of healthcare service available. Telehealth was the saving grace for the healthcare industry throughout the public health emergency. While not everything that was forced upon us during the pandemic will remain as we continue to move along, it seems that telehealth services may remain permanently.

In December 2020, Elan Skilled Nursing and Rehab initiated the use of telehealth services for our nursing facility residents. "At Elan Skilled, we were looking not only to better position our campus through the remainder of the COVID-19 pandemic as well as any future public health emergencies but to also employ an innovative way to provide the necessary medical services within the walls of our facility without sending our residents to the hospital unnecessarily," according to Mary Rose Applegate, Nursing Home Administrator.

"Treating our residents here at Elan Skilled provides higher quality outcomes while avoiding unnecessary care transitions, which further increases the risk of negative outcomes for our residents."

Nursing home patients are among our most vulnerable population. Hospital stays for seniors residing in nursing homes often result in poor outcomes. Removing seniors from their home environment and from the caregivers who know them best often results in increased confusion and disorientation along with the increased risk of missed identification of early indications of changes in condition that allow for early treatment of acute health problems.

Additionally, nursing home residents

often have vulnerable immune systems and exposing them to hospital germs for any period of time can increase the risk of infection.

Gina McCabe, Director of Nursing at Elan Skilled, notes that: "Our residents are being admitted with more medically complex needs that require our nurses to perform more frequent assessments and have a higher competency level caring for complicated medical conditions that are often significantly progressed when they come to us.

"When our residents need medical care, it often cannot wait until their physician's next scheduled visit. We need access to physician services, at all hours of the day, night and weekend to respond to our resident's medical problems timely and avoid hospital transfers and declines in condition."

As of February 2023, Elan Skilled has completed over 1,000 telehealth consults since implementation, averaging between 40 and 50 resident consults each month.

Telehealth visits are typically used for abnormal assessment findings, such as vital signs, lung sounds, or heart sounds. New concerns that develop, such as skin abnormalities, swelling, lethargy, pain, and abnormal test results are also common visit reasons. Residents who fall may also warrant a telehealth visit.

Gina McCabe reports: "Staff are strongly encouraged to utilize telehealth for even subtle changes or findings. We know from experience that when problems are identified and treated early before they are allowed to exacerbate, our residents have much better outcomes."

5-Star Quality Measures Rating

Elan Skilled scored a 5-Star on their most recent Quality Measure Star

Rating issued by CMS as part of the 5-Star Rating Program.

The percentage of Elan Skilled's shortstay residents who were re-hospitalized after a nursing home admission is 12.6%, significantly less than the state and national average of 21% and 22% respectively.

The percentage of short-stay residents who have had an outpatient emergency department visit is only 4% compared to 11.8% at the national level and 9.3% across Pennsylvania.

For our long-stay residents with outpatient emergency department visits per 1,000 resident days most recently scored 0.42 compared to the national performance benchmark of 1.02 and state performance of 0.67.

Mary Rose Applegate offers: "These key performance indicators are reflective of the impact of our very competent nursing team coupled with our telehealth physician services.

"Our nursing leadership team has really worked with our nursing staff to teach and train on complex care management strategies and early identification of key changes in condition that has afforded our residents to receive medical treatment in the very early stages of their health problem before it requires a hospital level of treatment. I am so proud of our team and their success in treating 96% of our telehealth resident consultations right here on the Elan Skilled campus last year.

Renovation Of The Bridge at Elan Moves Toward April Completion

Elan Skilled Nursing and Rehab's second-floor renovation project is steadily progressing as the opening of the state-of-the-art short stay rehab unit with a Dialysis Den draws near. The targeted completion date is mid-April 2023.

Elan Skilled is partnering with DaVita Kidney Care to develop the space, which will accommodate residents in need of transitional care to bridge the gap between their hospital stay and a return home.

The dialysis section is just part of the renovation project, which also includes updated flooring, paint, counter tops, doors, lighting, heating system, and furniture.

Painting is 90% complete. New VRF (Variable Refrigerant Flow) heating units have been installed, cabinetry work is being completed and flooring installation is next.

Elan Skilled looks forward to the completion of this project and the ability to expand services to the local and surrounding communities.




Greetings from Webster Towers!
